This is a Transitional C Program. These people are already hired and teaching in Bard College's public schools in NYC. All have their PHD's in the discipline and have enrolled in the Bard MAT Trans C program to obtain their certification so they can continue to teach in the Bard High School Early Colleges in Manhattan and Queens. They have three years to complete coursework leading to Professional certification. They spend those three years teaching full time in their school in the subject area they are being certified in, adding up to over 3K hours of Field Experience. They are not supervised by MAT faculty in their schools as it is not a student teaching placement and they are reviewed and observed by administration in their respective school districts. During these three years they also complete any remaining requirements for certification including edTPA.

There is commitment to providing MAT students with ongoing experiences in public school classrooms that will balance graduate studies with the challenges of teaching. The classroom experience is structured as a developmental sequence that moves apprentices towards increased responsibility for student learning under the guidance of mentor teachers and MAT faculty. MAT students begin work in a local summer school program as tutors during the first (summer) term. They begin the first of two student teaching placements in September, on the first day of school, and remain in this placement for 6 full weeks. They enter their second placement in February and remain in this placement for 12 full weeks. All students spend a total of 18 or more weeks in the classroom, with two different teaching placements, one in a middle school and one in a high school. Both of these placements occur under the supervision of a partner mentor teacher and a full-time faculty supervisor.

The Bard MAT Program works closely with our "Partner Schools". Student Teachers are placed with trained mentor teachers and supervised by trained MAT discipline and education faculty members. Training and courses are adapted to meet the changing needs of the schools we work with and other schools in the areas where our graduates teach. Attention is given to the challenges faced by new teachers, and instruction in the education courses focus on differently-abled students, diverse classrooms, ESL and varying socio-economic and cultural backgrounds. The Bard MAT Program also has a very strong support network in place for our graduates and alumni/ae to support them in their teaching careers with advisement from faculty, lesson planning, and graduate course offerings for professional development and or graduate credit. Our education courses focus on all aspects of student learning, including working with students with disabilities, ESL students, and inclusive classrooms. All of our students receive at least one placement in a high needs school and the education courses have a focus on working with and teaching children from low-income families.
