Course Description

Berlin's musical life presents an embarrassment of riches- where to begin? This course helps you chart a path through Berlin's endlessly fascinating musical offerings, from chamber music to symphonic music and opera, covering a wide range of musical styles from the last three hundred years. We will make field trips to attend concerts, masterclasses, and open rehearsals throughout the city, Corona regulations and safety permitting. We will also explore a range of musical performances in digital format, from live broadcasts to historical recordings. Choice of events to attend, in person or virtually, will depend on Corona regulations, scheduling, and the availability of free or low-cost tickets. Venues may include Komische Oper, Barenboim-Said Akademie, Berlin Philharmonie, Berlin Konzerthaus. We will prepare for each event by reading texts (musicological, historical, critical), listening to recordings, and watching videos. We will host guests representing the rich variety of current musical and interdisciplinary art in Berlin. Written requirements will include short weekly assignments relevant to the week's subject and two longer assignments such as a concert review or a response to one of the musical events we attend. Each student will also give an oral presentation on a piece of music, performer, composer, or musical organization with ties to Berlin. No prior musical knowledge is required for this course: music-lovers and musicians of all levels are equally welcome.

This course is organized with Google Classroom. Materials will be provided there.

Requirements

Academic Integrity

Bard College Berlin maintains the highest standards of academic integrity and expects students to adhere to these standards at all times. <u>Attendance</u>

Bard College Berlin does not offer credit for any course in which a student has missed more than 30% of classes, regardless of the reasons

for the absences, whether excused or unexcused. The full Bard College Berlin attendance policy can be found in the Student Handbook, Section 2.8.

Students are expected to attend all off-campus excursions punctually, from start to finish.

Special Considerations for Spring 2022

Some students or instructors may need to begin the semester remotely due to travel restrictions caused by the pandemic. Due to the unpredictable nature of the pandemic, situations could also arise during the semester that might prevent students or instructors from in-person attendance. In addition, all students and instructors must refrain from inperson attendance if they are feeling ill. Instructors will make efforts to offer alternatives to in-person attendance where needed, including remote participation or asynchronous options.

<u>Assignments</u>

- 1. Weekly written responses to assigned material, approximately 300 words
- 2. An oral presentation, 15-20 minutes, on a piece of music, performer, composer, or musical organization with ties to Berlin. The presentation should include background and discussion
- 3. Two papers, the first a review/reflection/report of a concert (approximately 1000 words), the second a piece that elaborates on one of the themes of our class (approximately 1500 words)

Presentation

To be given in class on a mutually coordinated date, no later than Tuesday, May 3.

Grade Breakdown

- 1. On-time responses to weekly questions: 20%

- 3. Oral presentation: 20%
- 4. Two papers: 40%

Policy on Late Submission of Papers

Essays that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded up to one full grade (from B+ to C+, for example). Instructors are not obliged to accept essays that are more than 24 hours late. If a legitimate extension is needed, students must make a request no later than 3 days before the due date, barring special circumstances. Where an instructor agrees to accept a late essay, it must be submitted within four weeks of the deadline. Thereafter, the student will receive a

failing grade for the assignment. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students are also entitled to make an appointment to discuss essay assignments and feedback during instructors' office hours.

Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.
