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OLIve-Plus Curriculum Overview

The OLIve-Plus program prepares students for Masters study at Central European University. It is specifically geared to build on an already strong academic background and on a level of English that is at least at B2 level. The curriculum includes multiple courses that seek to facilitate the aim of MA degree entry.

The cornerstone of the curriculum is tutoring which prepares students for further studies in their chosen field through intensive small-group study. Students audit classes at Bard College Berlin, have a seminar 'Introduction to Social Sciences' and take part in an academic seminar. These additional academic courses are intended to work in concert with the tutorials, providing further training in disciplinary knowledge and study skills.

The Academic Writing course supports the demands of the tutoring course and future graduate studies by providing an introduction to critical thinking, argumentation, use of sources and structuring papers. This course is a bridge between the tutoring/academic component of the course and the Academic English component.

The Academic English component of the program seeks to consolidate knowledge across the four key skill language areas and ensure students are linguistically ready for graduate study. There is also a TOEFL preparation course which focuses on techniques and strategies for exam taking.

Students will also fill out individual study plans overseen by the Academic Advisor and the Academic English Advisor, which are a constant record of how each student is progressing towards their goal of becoming a competitive MA applicant. There will also be a parallel study plan for each student which charts the progress from the perspective of OLIve-Plus faculty. All tutors and instructors will be asked to contribute to this plan on a bi-monthly basis.

Students also take part in an MA application seminar led by the Academic Advisor and the Academic English Advisor. The MA Application Seminar is intended to ensure that students understand the requirements and prepare competitive applications for CEU MA degrees by the end of the OLIve-Plus program.

The OLIve-Plus program is designed to offer a comprehensive foundation for further academic study at graduate level, linking high-level academic training with Academic English skills.



Program Learning Outcomes

The Program Learning Outcomes of OLIve-Plus describe what students are expected to know by the time of graduation. These are the knowledge and skills that OLIve-Plus students acquire while progressing through the Program. Each course has its independent learning outcomes outlined in syllabi.

1. Disciplinary knowledge

An understanding of key foundational theories, concepts and ideas of the tutored subject and an ability to apply these to further study at the graduate level.

2. Analytical and writing skills at graduate level

The ability to analyse academic texts and write arguments that reflect a refined understanding of appropriate theories and concepts. The ability to communicate this in essays and other pieces of writing appropriate to the discipline being studied,



and in oral communication including academic presentations.

3. Academic English

Knowledge of Academic English appropriate to graduate study, using vocabulary, including concepts and theories, and syntax appropriate to graduate study.

4. Standardised English testing

Familiarity with the protocols of standardised English testing and a foundation in English writing, speaking and listening appropriate for successfully passing standardised English exams.

5. Study skills

The ability and motivation for independent study, including undertaking independent research projects, and a clear understanding of future study goals.

Gained through: Capstone Project, all courses

6. Critical learning skills

The ability and motivation to actively engage in academic discussions and to develop a critical approach to knowledge and disciplines based on a holistic approach to learning that encourages both collaborative and independent study.

7. Knowledge of ethical obligations in academic study

A thorough understanding of the rules of academic citation and how to avoid plagiarism. A clear understanding of how to engage with peers and teachers in a critical yet respectful way. The ability to ask for and expect a respectful approach from peers and teachers.

1. MA Application Seminar

Description: The purpose of this seminar is to prepare OLIve-Plus students for making their applications to CEU programs.

2. Introduction to Graduate Writing at Central European University

Description: The course seeks to develop writing skills necessary within a graduate level English-speaking academic community. It will do this by raising awareness of, practicing, and reflecting upon the conventions of written texts. This is an



introduction to reading strategies, critical thinking and critique writing. The course will raise students' awareness of the conventions of research-based academic writing. It will examine structural elements such as the introduction and conclusion, and the effective use of sources. Students will also have the chance to reflect on how these conventions influence the development of one's own voice through the production of their own academic texts.

3. Academic Tutoring

Description: The goal of academic tutoring is to build on students' knowledge of the subject which they plan to study at Masters level and to assist students in making competitive applications to these programs.

4. Introduction to Social Sciences

Description: The aim of this course is to introduce students to key concepts of the social sciences. The



key focus is to think about how we 'know' in the social sciences - what constitutes knowledge in the social sciences and what are the political and other implications of such knowledge?

The course will center on thinking through the relation of knowledge to power. By the end of the course, students will have an introductory sense of how social scientists come to define a subject of inquiry and how, as we study or research, we as social scientists emphasise some issues and questions while dismissing or making invisible others. What are the gendered, racial and class biases of social sciences thinking?

5. Mandatory Auditing



6. Additional Auditing

Description: These classes could, for example, respond to a skills gap (eg. BCB Math class) or broaden knowledge for a student applying to

7. Academic Seminar

Description: This course runs in conjunction with regular consultations with the Academic Advisor.

The aims of the Academic Seminar are to (1) develop students' capstone projects through discussions and consultations with the Academic Advisor, (2) provide students with a forum for engaging with each other and with the Bard community on academic issues and questions that are of interest to them. Following an initial session led by Bard and OLIve-Plus faculty, students will team up in pairs and organise sessions on issues that are of interest to them with assistance from the Academic Advisor.



The capstone project should build on your final assignment of your tutorial but should not be identical to this. You should discuss how to proceed with the Academic Advisor, the aim is for you to creatively explore other aspects of the topic of your final assignment that can be brought out through different types of assignments.

8. Academic English

Description: A key goal of OLIve-Plus is to prepare students with an advanced level of English for the rigors of studying for a graduate degree in an English medium learning environment. Following this, the purpose of the Academic English class is to ensure students are ready for this challenge. The Academic English classes should help students identify any gaps in knowledge, refresh existing skills and practice using English in ways relevant to graduate study.

9. TOEFL Preparation

Description: This course prepares students to take the TOEFL exam. It teaches them techniques and strategies to successfully navigate the demands of an international standardized English test. These include note taking skills, reading skills, and practice of how to write clearly and in a structured way under strict time restrictions. The course will include mock tests in order to replicate an exam environment.


