## **Course Description**

This course runs in conjunction with regular consultations with the Academic Advisor.

The aims of the Academic Seminar are to (1) develop students' capstone projects through discussions and consultations with the Academic Advisor, (2) provide students with a forum for engaging with each other and with the Bard community on academic issues and questions that are of interest to them. Following an initial session led by Bard and OLIve faculty, students will team up in pairs and organise sessions on issues that are of interest to them with assistance from the Academic Advisor.

The capstone project should build on your final assignment of your tutorial but should not be identical to this. You should discuss how to proceed with the Academic Advisor, the aim is for you to creatively explore other aspects of the topic of your final assignment that can be brought out through different types of assignments.

## Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, students should have:

- 1. Experience in organising seminars
- 2. A critical overview of their research topics
- 3. Ability to critically engage with peers on different topics

### Requirements

This is a mandatory course for OLIve-Plus students. Students will participate in all seminars and will lead one seminar each.

The course will be assessed through a combination of assignments which are designed to achieve the overall goals and learning outcomes of the course.

**Participation in class**: You are expected to attend all the classes, prepare the required reading for each class, and actively participate in class discussions. You will be assessed on the quality and quantity of your contributions. The highest grades for participation will be awarded to those who make valuable contributions to class discussions and demonstrate an understanding of and engagement with the readings. Attending without contributing to group work or class discussions will only earn you a minimum pass..

**Capstone project prospectus:** You should submit a brief overview of the capstone project which you will work on with your tutor and in consultation with the Academic Advisor. This should outline what the project is about and what your key arguments will be. Take note also of how the project connects to your future MA study.

**Capstone project presentation:** You are expected to give a 15-minute presentation of your capstone project.

#### Academic Integrity

This is a course for grade. Taken together with consultations with the academic advisor, this is 6-credit course.

Requirements for successful completion of the course are: preparation for classes, attendance regular, active participation; capstone project prospectus; presentation of capstone project.

Evaluation: Seminar preparation and participation: 30%; capstone project prospectus: 30%; presentation of research: 40%

#### The University and the Liberal Arts

#### Student-led sessions

Students will work in pairs to organise a seminar on a topic that is of interest to them. Think about an issue or a problem that you care about or one that you wish to know more about and one that is also connected to your final assignment. You should think about how the seminar could be organised in ways to help you think about your final assignment and develop a capstone project.. Consider how this topic could be examined from different angles, by yourself and perhaps with invited speakers (the seminar leader will help you identify speakers). Your session could be in the form of a 'roundtable' or a more traditional talk. You should feel free to speak or simply to chair and organise and ask questions of the speaker and your fellow students. You should see this as an opportunity to raise awareness

about a topic that you care about and that is important to you.

These sessions will be open to other Bard College students and faculty.
