Course Description

Berlin's musical life presents an embarrassment of riches- where to begin? This course helps you chart a path through Berlin's endlessly fascinating musical offerings, from chamber music to symphonic music and opera, covering a wide range of musical styles from the last three hundred years. We will attend concerts throughout the city as well as musical performances in digital format. Choice of events to attend will depend on scheduling and the availability of low-cost tickets. Venues will include the Philharmonie Berlin, the Schillertheater, Hangar 1 of the former Tempelhof Airport, and the Villa Elisabeth. We will prepare for each event by reading texts (musicological, historical, critical), listening to recordings, and watching videos. We will host several guests representing the rich variety of current musical life in Berlin. Written requirements will include weekly short assignments, two short quizzes, and two longer assignments: a midterm and a final. No prior musical knowledge is required for this course: music-lovers and musicians of all levels are equally welcome. This course is organized with Google Classroom, where all materials will be provided.

<u>Requirements</u>

Students are expected to:

• Turn off phones during class time.

- Respond to emails from their professors in a timely manner.
- Attend punctually and completely all classes and off-campus events.
- Complete assigned work on time.
- Actively participate in class discussions.
- Remain open, curious, and engaged throughout the semester.

<u>Attendance</u>

• Attendance at <u>all classes and off-campus excursions</u> is a crucial part of the education offered by Bard College Berlin. To account for minor circumstances, one absence (that is, absence from one three-hour session) will not affect the participation grade or require documentation.

• Students should not attend class when they test positive for COVID-19. The option of remote participation in class is not offered this semester. Bard College Berlin may not offer credit for any course in which a student has missed more than 30% of classes, regardless of the reasons for the absences. The full Bard College Berlin attendance policy can be found in the Student Handbook, Section 2.8.

• You may encounter circumstances that prevent you from attending classes for which you may be excused, meaning that the absence will not impact your grade. These circumstances include illness, religious observance, military obligation, attendance at a conference, a Bard Network event, a civic engagement initiative, a research trip or other compelling circumstance outside of your control (i.e. court appearance, visa appointment, death of a family member). Optional non-academic travel, hosting visiting family and friends, or work schedules are not ground for excused absences. You will be allowed to self-report your absence one time, meaning that a notification informing your instructor about the reason for your absence before or within 24 hours of the class is sufficient. If you miss class more than once you will need to provide your instructor with appropriate documentation in order to be excused (i.e. a doctor's note).

• If you have any general medical issues or other concerns that could impact your compliance with these regulations, you need to inform your instructor during the first week of the semester. Tardiness after fifteen minutes will be considered an absence.

• All unexcused absences will lower the final grade by one step (i.e. if your final grade is a B, you will be downgraded to a B-).

Policy on Late Submission of Papers

• Assignments (essays, presentations, homework) that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The professor is not obliged to accept essays that are more than 24 hours late. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students are also entitled to make an appointment to discuss assignments and feedback during instructors' office hours.

• Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

Assessment

Participation and preparation: Please complete the required homework (readings, listening, viewing, assignments) and contribute creatively and meaningfully to the exercises and discussions in class. You will receive a participation grade which is based on your in-class engagement and completion of homework. Please reserve 3 hours on average for weekly class preparation and asynchronous class work. Readings will be made available on Google Classroom.

Assignments and due dates

Students are asked to:

- Complete weekly short written assignments: approximately 300 words each. Due in advance of each class.
- Take two quizzes: on Oct. 17 and on Nov. 21. The quizzes will review previous homework assignments and material already covered in class.
- Submit a midsemester essay: Approximate length 1000 words. Due October 20 by midnight.
- Create a final Project, in two parts:
 - Part I: a first draft of final essay, approximately 1000-1200 words, presented in class on Nov. 28 as an 8-10 minute oral presentation.
 - Part II: a final essay, approximate length 1500 words. Due December 15 by midnight.

Course Grade Breakdown

- Active classroom participation: 10% (attendance, contributions to discussions)
- Weekly written assignments: 20%
- Quizzes: 20% (10% per quiz, two quizzes in total)
- Midterm essay: 20%

• Final Project: 30%, of which 10% is the 10-minute presentation and written draft, 20% is the final essay
