

# FA103 Found Fragments & Layered Lines: Mixed-media Techniques for Drawing and Collage

# **Course Description**

This studio art course explores contemporary and historical approaches to drawing and collage. Suitable for all levels of artistic ability, the goal is to enhance aesthetic comprehension and personal expression through creating mixed-media drawings and collages. We begin by transcribing embodied experience into two-dimensional compositions, attending to our perceptual awareness in order to strengthen the coordination of mind, eyes, and hands. Course activities will ask students to: make analytical drawings of figure / object arrangements, develop conceptual methods of composing, make abstractions from nature by working outdoors, gather materials from Berlin's famous Flohmärkte (flea markets) to use in collages and assemblages, work collaboratively on large-scale drawings, produce linoleum block prints, and experiment with innovative combinations of text and imagery. A core theme will be exploring the potential to generate new and surprising content from the juxtaposition of found printed fragments and hand-drawn lines. Of special interest for our discussions will be works created by current and historical Berliners, such as Dada artist Hannah Höch. The majority of classes are studio work sessions. There will also be several group critiques, slideshow presentations, and artist studio / gallery visits. The semester culminates in the "Open Studios" exhibition and a printed publication of student artworks. Students are expected to be self-motivated, open to exploring new ways of working, and comfortable sharing their artworks during class discussions. This course will require a significant investment of time working outside of class sessions.

## Requirements

#### Students are expected to:

- Turn off phones during class time.
- Attend ALL class sessions, especially the group critiques.
- Students are expected to finish work for all assignments and projects on time.
- Allocate extra time for preparation and clean-up.
- Practice good studio etiquette, respectfully use shared work spaces and return shared materials to the proper shelves.
- Initiate appointments with the Professor or arts staff outside of class time.
- Respond to emails from the professor in a timely manner.

- Inform their professors at the beginning of the semester if photos of the student's identity, artwork, works in progress are NOT to be taken and / or used for Bard College Berlin.
- Remove all artworks, art materials, and / or any personal belongings before the end of the semester. Failure to remove works or return spaces clean and empty may result in final grade penalization. Donating unrequested artworks and / or art materials is not permitted and will still be considered student property, expected to be removed by your inspection deadline. #### <u>Attendance</u>

Students are expected to punctually attend ALL class sessions.

Attendance is a crucial part of the education offered by Bard College Berlin. To account for minor circumstances, ONE absence from a once-per-week course should not affect the grade or require documentation. More than one unexcused absence will significantly lower the final grade.

Tardiness more than 10 minutes will be marked as an absence.

## Assessment & Grade Breakdown

Students will receive midterm and final grades for their work.

Students are assessed on their willingness to experiment, their contributions exchanging feedback during critiques, and on their ability to work effectively both together in collaborative groups and independently throughout the semester. Grading will reflect the creative ambition, time invested, strength of concept, technical execution, and overall quality of the finished artworks. This assessment will also include the student's ability to adequately budget their time for working and clean-up of the materials and spaces used at BCB.

70% Work (meaning all artworks made for class, presented for critiques, and assignments.)
30% Attendance, participation in critiques / discussions, and professionalism (being serious, efficient, respectful.)

Assignments are due at the beginning of the class session. Detailed information about assignments and projects will be explained in class. Assignments and the dates described in this syllabus are subject to change by the instructor. Students will be notified of any changes to the syllabus in class and via email. Students must regularly check their BCB email accounts.

Students are encouraged to make appointments with the instructor during office hours to discuss assignments and participation, or they may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

IMPORTANT- Please be aware that basic art materials will be provided, though some materials may need to be purchased directly by each student at their own expense depending on individual project goals.

#### Policy on Late Submission of Artworks / Presentations

Assignments (artworks, essays, performances, oral presentations) that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The Professor is not obliged to accept assignments that are more than 24 hours late. Where a professor agrees to accept a late assignment, it should be submitted by the new deadline agreed upon by both parties. Thereafter, the student will receive a failing grade for the assignment. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students may make an appointment to discuss assignments and

feedback during instructors' office hours.

Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

## Schedule

Week 1: Sept 5 Introduction to course, expectations, and materials.

Begin drawing; exploring gesture, contour, negative space, shape, and shading. Paul Klee, "An active line on a walk, moving freely, without goal." (Drawing is taking a line for a walk.) Bauhaus Vorkurs drawing exercises, "Skating on Paper," "Skating

on Paper, circumnavigating dots," etc.

Assignment: 3 finished drawings on 3 sheets of paper, combining words listed in class.

Wk 2: Sept 12 Draw without drawing, Exquisite Corpse, and the "Wangechi von Wulffen Method."

(artists referenced: Wangechi Mutu & Amelie von Wulffen)

Individual & collaborative drawing. Assess & discuss works made during class.

Assignment: 3 finished drawings using techniques demonstrated in class. 1) Fantastical Figures

2) Psychological Space 3) Artist's Choice.

Wk 3: Sept 19 Slide presentation & discussion of drawing from memory vs. direct observation.

Draw object arrangements, rhopography compositions.

Assignment: 1 finished drawing: a highly detailed rendering of a chosen object, drawn

actual size, as small as possible, and as large as possible on a single page. Also, 2 photographic compositions which include the detailed drawing.

Wk 4: Sept 26 "1,000 Hours of Staring" slideshow. Horror Vacui / Kenophobia drawing projects.

Drawings that engage the paper edge-to-edge, paying special attention to time, process, technique, materials. Discuss automatic drawing, randomness, patterns,

and conceptual strategies.

Assignment: 2 finished Horror Vacui / Kenophobia / Edge-to-edge conceptual drawings.

(This assignment is due Oct 10.)

Wk 5: Oct 3 \*\*\*Federal holiday – No Class Today\*\*\*

Wk 6: Oct 10 Studio work session, individual meetings to discuss Midterm Project progress.

Assignment: Finish Midterm Projects.

Wk 7: Oct 17 Midterm Projects due today. Midterm presentations and group critique.

(Attendance and participation is especially important.)

Assignment: Finish cutting lino blocks.

Assignment: Finish a set of prints.

Wk 10: Nov 14 Share & discuss linocut prints. Projects combining words and images, Dada poems,

Cut-up technique, aleatory & oblique strategies. Slideshow and discussion of the

possibilities and challenges that arise with combinations of text and images.

Assignment: 3 finished works combining text and imagery. 1) Combining found printed text with

hand-drawn elements. 2) Using hand-drawn text. 3) Artist's choice.

Wk 11: Nov 21 Share & discuss text / image pieces. Slideshow and discussion covering histories

and

lasting influence of collage. Studio work session, begin Final Project.

Assignment: Work on Final Project.

Wk 12: Nov 28 Studio work session, individual meetings to discuss Final Project.

Assignment: Finish Final Project.

Wk 13: Dec 5 Installation of artworks. Presentation and critique of Final Projects.

Wk 14: Dec 12 Continue critiques of Final Projects.

Friday, Dec 13 "Open Studios" exhibition from 4-8pm. (date / time may change.)

Dec 16 - 20 Completion Week. Studios must be clean, artworks & personal materials removed.

# Policy on the use of BCB Facilities:

- 1. The Factory (Eichenstrasse 43) and Monopol (Provinzstr 40-44) at BCB offer space and facilities to BCB art students. Chip access is from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. every day, including the weekends during the semester. The buildings cannot be used outside these hours.
- 2. Fire exits and lanes must be kept clear of any obstructions.
- 3. Students agree only to use the designated class spaces or communal workshops. Respecting the building and its facilities is crucial, as they are shared resources that need to be preserved for the benefit of all.
- 4. For your safety and the safety of others, smoking and drinking alcohol are strictly prohibited anywhere inside the building.
- 5. Unauthorized events and/or parties are not permitted. Projects using open flames (such as candles, torches, lanterns, fireworks, etc.) are not permitted inside the building.
- 6. Spray painting and handling any hazardous (chemical or combustible) material is not permitted inside the building.
- 7. All work surfaces (indoor and outdoor) must be adequately protected with the workshop's drop cloth before spray painting or working with plaster.



- 8. During completion week, any space used by a student must be emptied, with clean walls and floors. All garbage must be adequately disposed of. Final grades may be affected or withheld if any item remains by the inspection deadline.
- 9. When leaving the building, students must ensure all lights are turned off, all electrical items must be unplugged, and doors MUST be closed.
