FA317 Advanced Painting: Illusionistic Surfaces

Course Description

This advanced studio course is designed to cultivate technical and conceptual abilities within the field of contemporary painting. A central focus of this course will be ideas, issues, and techniques relating to realistic depiction, illusionistic space, and mimetic representation in paint. Students will develop and pursue individual projects while engaging in group discussions of: the politics of the gaze, the painted canvas as object (surface) and illusionistic window, the triarchy of subject-content-context in artworks, mimesis as visual metaphor, the narrative implications of vantage point, using shadow and light to suggest (the passage of) time, and histories of linear perspective and fictive space. Students will gain experience and understanding of the differences between painting from photographic references, direct observation, and imagination. Artworks will primarily be made with oil and acrylic paints, but experimentation with other materials is encouraged and supported. Weekly sessions will include slide presentations, readings, and discussions, yet the majority of class time will be spent painting.

instructor for individual feedback and support. Evaluations and critiques will occur at midterm and at the end of term. The semester culminates in the "Open Studios'' exhibition at the BCB arts building at Monopol Berlin.

<u>Attendance</u>

Students are expected to attend ALL class sessions on time and for the full duration of class. *Tardiness more than 15 minutes will be considered an absence.*

Attendance at all classes is a crucial part of the education offered by Bard College Berlin. More than one unexcused absence will significantly lower the final grade.

<u>Assessment</u>

Students will receive a midterm grade and a final grade for this course.

Students are assessed on their willingness to experiment, their contributions exchanging feedback during discussions / critiques, and on their ability to work effectively throughout the semester. Grading will reflect the creative ambition, time investment, strength of concept, skillful execution, and overall quality of the finished artworks. This assessment will also include the student's ability to adequately manage their time for working and clean-up of the materials and spaces used at BCB.

Grade Breakdown

- 70% Work (meaning all artworks made for class, presented for critiques, and assignments.)
- 30% Attendance, participation in critiques / discussions, and professionalism (being punctual, effective, respectful.)

Assignments are due at the beginning of the class session. Detailed information about assignments and projects will be explained in class. Assignments and the dates described in this syllabus are subject to change by the instructor. Students will be notified of any changes to the syllabus in class and via email. Students must regularly check their BCB email accounts.

Students are encouraged to make appointments with the instructor during office hours to discuss assignments and participation, or they may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

IMPORTANT- Please be aware that basic art materials will be provided, though some materials may need to be purchased directly by each student at their own expense depending on individual project goals.

Policy on Late Submission of Artworks / Presentations

Assignments (artworks, projects, or presentations) that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The Professor is not obliged to accept assignments that are more than 24 hours late. Where a professor agrees to accept a late assignment, it should be

submitted by the new deadline agreed upon by both parties. Thereafter, the student will receive a failing grade for the assignment. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students may make an appointment to discuss assignments and feedback during instructors' office hours.

Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

Wk 4: Feb 20 Assignment:	Class trip to the Brücke Museum , view exhibition, "Lise Gujer: A New Way of Painting." <i>Begin Painting Project #2.</i>
Wk 5: Feb 27 Assignment:	Slideshow and discussion on Light / Shadow / Time, how the depiction of light implies the passage of time, color as light and how to use color more effectively. Studio work. <i>Finish Painting Project #2.</i>
Wk 6: Mar 6 Assignment:	Group Critiques (Artists #1-5) followed by a studio work session. Begin Painting Project #3 (Midterm)
Wk 7: Mar 13 Assignment:	Group Critiques (Artists #6-10). followed by a studio work session. Finish Project #3. (Midterm)
Wk 8: Mar 20 Assignment:	Project #3 (Midterm) due today. Group Critiques (Artists #11-15). Studio work. Begin Painting Project #4. (Final Project)
Wk 9: Mar 27 Assignment:	Slideshow and discussion on the power and politics of the painted gaze, the agency of the subject, how is the subject represented, working from photographic references versus direct observation or imagination. Studio work. <i>Continue Painting Project #4 (Final Project)</i>

BCB Arts Facility Guidelines

Direktorenhaus at Monopol (Provinzstraße 40-44)

- 1. BCB has facilities and studio spaces at the Factory (Eichenstraße 43) and Monopol (Provinzstraße 40-44) for BCB art students to use. Chip card access to these buildings is from 8am to 10pm daily, including weekends during the semester. The facilities cannot be used outside these hours.
- 2. Fire exits and lanes must be kept clear of any obstructions.
- 3. Students agree to use only the designated class spaces and communal workshops. Respecting the buildings, studio spaces, and guidelines is crucial, these are shared resources that need to be preserved for the benefit of all.
- 4. For your safety and the safety of others, smoking and drinking alcohol are strictly prohibited anywhere inside the building.
- 5. Unauthorized events and/or parties are not permitted. Projects using open flames (such as candles, torches, lanterns, fireworks, etc.) are not permitted inside the building.
- 6. Spray painting and handling any hazardous (chemical or combustible) material is not permitted inside the building.
- 7. All work surfaces (indoor and outdoor) must be adequately protected with the workshop's drop cloth before spray painting or working with plaster.
- 8. During completion week, any space used by a student must be emptied, with clean walls and floors. All garbage and waste must be safely and properly disposed of. Final grades may be affected or withheld if items remain by the inspection deadline.

Wk 4: Feb 20	Slideshow and discussion: Mixing accurate colors. Overview of color theory and terminology, color wheels, Hue-Value-Chroma, crispening, local color, color constancy. Hands-on paint mixing and matching colors exercise.
Assignment:	Begin Painting Project #2. Plus, mix 6 accurate colors from found color swatches.
Wk 5: Feb 27	Compare painting from photographic references with direct observation. Mimetic representation, realism, figuration, illusionism. Discuss the possibilities and problems of representational painting in an era of ubiquitous high-res digital photography and Photoshop.
Assignment:	Finish Painting Project #2
Wk 6: Mar 6	Slideshow and discussion: painting from imagination and visual memory, the uncanny, oneiric, and surreal.
Assignment:	Begin Painting Project #3 (Midterm)
Wk 7: Mar 13 Assignment:	Slideshow and discussion: Defining the subject, content, and context of a painting. <i>Finish Project #3 (Midterm)</i>
Wk 8: Mar 20	<i>Project #3 (Midterm)</i> due today. Midterm presentations & group critiques.

Wk 9: Mar 27	Slideshow and discussion: edges, perspective, spatial depth, fore- and background, atmospheric space & light. Accompanying their final project, students will write a short statement illuminating the concepts and intentions of their project and/or practice. This text should explain and clarify the "what, why, how" of their projects.

Wk 10: Apr 3	Slideshow and discussion: politics of the <i>gaze</i> , who / what is being seen / shown, objectification, implied power dynamics, how is the subject represented.
