TH 326 Adapting Novels for the Stage: Virginia Woolf's *Orlando*

Course Description

Virginia Woolf's masterpiece *Orlando* is fairytale-like portrait of a young aristocrat who barely ages over the course of four hundred years and seven historical periods, changing gender and witnessing the state of flux of people, systems, nature and what is right or wrong. *Orlando* is funny, malicious, and provocative and an exploration of gender fluidity. How can theatre artists attempt to dramatise a famous and complex novel such as *Orlando* and transform it into material for the theatre? How do you even begin to create your own theatrical language or tackle practical issues like conjuring the sense of time passing on stage?

This seminar will explore different contemporary methods of adapting literary works for the theatre. Our work will not be about solely about reproducing, but will focus more on reinvention. First, students will learn ways to develop a conceptual approach to creating a piece of theatre inspired by the themes, language, and story of Woolf's *Orlando*. In a workshop setting, students will work together as directors and dramaturges to adapt sections of *Orlando* into a script for the stage. In the second half of the semester, students will form teams to further develop their scripts and experiment with stage ideas in the rehearsal room as actors and directors. Throughout the semester, we will also study and examine director Katie Mitchell's 2019 production of *Orlando* at the Schaubühne Berlin and other recent /German theater productions of *Orlando* at the Schauspiel Hannover, Deutsches Theater and the Thalia Theater in Hamburg.

Requirements

Students are expected to:

- Turn off phones during class time.
- Initiate appointments with Professor or Arts Staff outside of class time.
- Always allocate extra time for work preparation and clean-up for independent production.
- Respond to emails from Professor in a timely manner.
- Inform Professor at the beginning of the semester if photos of student's identity, performance work, works in progress are NOT to be taken and / or used for Bard College Berlin.

Scene Study / Final Projects:

Scene Study Requirements:

- Develop a performance inspired or based on *Orlando* that you would like to explore and conceptualise, devise, and rehearse as an actor or director.
- One additional three hour rehearsal per week to be completed outside of class each week during the rehearsal process. The Scene Study will be discussed and critiqued on 15.5.2025
- Additional assignments to prepare the Scene Study will be posted on Google Classroom

Scene Study / Final Project Assessment

• Students will be graded on their preparation, completion of rehearsal reports (sent via email, 1-2 paragraphs in length), and the ability to discuss their ideas about the situation on stage, the concept approach to the performance, the characters or performer's roles in the scene, and what ideas about staging or interpretation of character are being tested in rehearsal. Actors will be assessed on their physicality, use of movement/gesture, delivery of lines, and a clear approach to their performance. Directors will be assessed on their use of space, movement/gesture, and clear intention of what is being explored in the scene.

The participation grade will be based on students' participation in class discussions and feedback given on other students' work. The following exercises will also be part of the participation grade for this course:

Character Portrait Assignment:

• Students will choose a character from Orlando to present in a simple non-verbal one minute performance in class on 26.02. Specific instructions for this assignment will be posted on the Google Classroom website.

Performance Exercise:

• Students will develop a short experimental scene in class using one chapter of Virginia Woolf's *Orlando*. This performance exercise will be worked on in class, yet also prepared outside of class. Presentations are on 12.3.

Set Design and Costume Design Exercise:

• Students will develop ideas for possible set and costume design for a potential theater production of *Orlando* in class. This set and costume exercise will first be worked on in class with set designer Iris Holstein and developed further by students outside of class. Students will then present their set and costume ideas for *Orlando* in class.

Written requirements:

Scene Study Essay (2000 words due 20.5.2025)

Scene Study Essay should contain the following:

- Rehearsal process: how the scene was chosen, a brief analysis of the scene (the situation, the language, the characters, the central conflict, including what theatrical devices or aspects of characterization were explored. What changes, additions, cuts, and did you and your team try out with Virginia Woolf's *Orlando*? Include descriptions from rehearsal, including what rehearsal (as actors or directors) methods and exercises were implemented, how they were implemented, and any relevant challenges and observations from rehearsals.
- Evaluation of the scene presentation

Grade Breakdown:	Scene Study 40%

Policy on Late Submission

Assignments (artworks, essays, performances, oral presentations) that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The Professor is not obliged to accept assignments that are more than 24 hours late. Where a Professor agrees to accept a late assignment, it must be submitted within four weeks of the deadline. Thereafter, the student will receive a failing grade for the assignment. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students are also entitled to make an appointment to discuss assignments and feedback during instructors' office hours.

Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

*Course readings can mostly be found posted on Google Classroom or on reserve in the BCB library.

<u>Recommended Books to Purchase:</u> It is recommended that students purchase their own copy of *Orlando (the* Oxford World's Classics edition would be best). There will be three copies of *Orlando* in the BCB library, but it would be convenient to have a personal copy.

Facility Guidelines:

The Factory Policy Agreement

1) "The Factory" at BCB (Eichenstrasse 43) has space and facilities available to BCB students with an academic purpose for using the building. Mandatory in-class

orientations are required to retain chip access to the Factory. Chip access to The Factory is from 7am to 10pm everyday during the semester. At 10pm students will be asked to leave the building by BCB security personnel.

- 2) Students agree to only use the common spaces that are available for their needs, and must respect private spaces that are off-limits. For requesting to reserve the dance / theater space and / or Seminar Room 6, please fill out the online <u>Factory Reservation</u> Form. The Factory Staff will get back to you within two weekdays. (Monday Friday).
- 3) No smoking is allowed anywhere inside the building. There are to be no projects using open flames (such as candles, torches, lanterns, fireworks, etc.) inside any part of the building.
- 4) Fire exits and lanes must be kept clear of any obstructions.
- 5) Spray painting and handling of any hazardous (chemical or combustible) material is not allowed inside the building. Contact the Studio Arts Manager concerning working with these materials. All work surfaces (indoor and outdoor) must be properly protected with a drop cloth or a packing paper provided by the workshop.
- 6) No sandals, flip-flops, or bare feet will be allowed inside the workshop and studio 6.
- Students must make sure all lights are turned off and doors are closed when leaving the building. No windows or doors are to be left opened or cracked. All electrical items must be unplugged when not in use.
- 8) If BCB workshop tools must be borrowed for a purpose outside of the building, please contact The Studio Arts Manager (by appointment).
- 9) There are to be no architectural changes to studios or any areas inside or outside of the building without first speaking with the Studio Arts Manager.
- 10) During completion week, any space used by a student must be returned empty with clean walls and floors. All garbage must be bagged (or boxed) and properly disposed of. Final grades may be penalized and / or fines imposed if items are left (or renovations unfinished) by the inspection deadline.
