Course Description

This is an <u>OSUN</u>Network Collaborative Course (<u>NCC</u>)

Adapted from the title of Edgar Morin and Jean Rouch's famous 1960 Paris documentary "Chronicle of a Summer", this is a joint film production course taught simultaneously on six different campuses (Bard Annandale, Bard Berlin, Al Quds, AUCA, BRAC, EHU). The goal of the course is to create a cinematic chronicle of each locality. The theme of these synchronized chronicles is also derived from Morin and Rouch's film; each chronicle takes as its prompt the deceptively simple question, "Are you happy?". By using this device, Chronicle of a Summer reveals a city filled with inhabitants considering ways in which colonialism, war, capital, race, and gender shape their personal and social experiences. In our course, we aim to capture the complexities of contemporary life in specific locations within a limited time frame, guided by the similarly evocative question: "What is your dream?"

Attendance

- Attendance of ALL classes is expected.

Assignments that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The instructor is not obliged to accept assignments that are more than 24 hours late. Thereafter, the student will receive a failing grade for the assignment. Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. A key component of your participation grade will be your constructive contributions during screenings, network zooms and assignment feedback sessions.

Ice Breaker - due February 14th

Each student records a 60 - 90 seconds tour of their respective space/place (could be "their daily commute to campus", a tour of their room/home, their campus, their neighborhood, etc.). The videos will be posted to padlet and shared in small break out rooms during our first network session. Videos should be uploaded to padlet by February 14th.

AV Room – Platanenstrasse 98 (downstairs) AV Room Policy Agreement

- 1) BCB's AV (Audio-Visual) Room provides a limited quantity of AV equipment to support those students enrolled in arts classes that require specific items.
- 2) Opening times may change every semester to adapt to specific course times and needs. Access is granted only with booked appointment: <u>https://avroom.youcanbook.me</u>
- 3) Items to be reserved on a specific date should be requested at least one week in advance. Without reservation, availability is limited to a first-come, first-serve basis.
- 4) All items checked out are due back during AV hours the following day, unless other arrangements have been made in advance directly with AV Staff.
- 5) AV equipment will be given out only to those students responsible in organizing, picking up as well as returning their items IN PERSON and ON TIME. No exceptions.
- 6) The AV Staff may exclude students from borrowing items at any time, if the student:
 - failed to return items in time
 - failed to return items in person (pick up and/ or return by friends is not allowed)
 - returned items with missing pieces
 - returned items damaged or in poor shape
- 7) All items returned late will be subject to a 1 Euro fine, per av day.
- 8) Any items returned without accessories (such as cables, SD card, batteries, tripod head, lens cap, etc) will be subject to a 1 Euro fine, per av day (the same as late returns).
- 9) Any items damaged or lost will be subject to patron reimbursement for its value up to a maximum of 250 EURO per item (or under special circumstances, replacement, at the discretion of AV Staff). Damaged or malfunctioning items are expected to be reported to Staff upon check-in.
- 10) AV equipment is limited at BCB. Whenever possible students are encouraged to use their own devices (computers, cameras) for production purposes.
