

FA103 Found Fragments & Layered Lines: Mixed-media Techniques for Drawing and Collage

Course Description

This studio art course explores contemporary and historical approaches to drawing and collage. Suitable for all levels of artistic ability, the goal is to enhance aesthetic comprehension and personal expression through the creation of mixed-media drawings and collages. We begin by transcribing embodied experience into visual compositions, attending to our visual perception to strengthen the coordination of mind, eyes, and hands. Course activities will ask students to: make analytical drawings of figures and/or object arrangements, develop conceptual methods of composing, make abstractions from nature by working outdoors, gather materials from Berlin's famous Flohmärkte (flea markets) to use in collages and assemblages, work collaboratively on large-scale drawings, and experiment with innovative combinations of text and imagery. A core theme will be exploring the potential to generate new and surprising content from the juxtaposition of found printed fragments and hand-drawn lines. Of special interest for our class discussions will be works created by current and historical Berliners, such as Dada artist Hannah Höch. The majority of classes are studio work sessions. There will also be several group critiques, weekly slideshow presentations, and contemporary art gallery visits. The semester culminates in the "Open Studios" exhibition in the BCB arts building at Monopol Berlin. Students are expected to be self-motivated, open to exploring new ways of working, and comfortable sharing their artworks in class.

Studio work is the priority, so this course will require a significant amount of time working outside of class sessions. Prospective students should email their questions to the professor directly at: j.kleckner@berlin.bard.edu

Requirements

Students are expected to:

<u>Attendance</u>

Students are expected to attend all class sessions on time and for the full duration of the session. *Tardiness more than 15 minutes will be considered an absence.*

Attendance at all classes is a crucial part of the education offered by Bard College Berlin. To account for minor circumstances, ONE absence from this once-per-week course should not affect the grade or require documentation. More than one unexcused absence will significantly lower the overall grade.

Bard College Berlin may not offer credit for any course in which a student has missed more than 30% of classes (4 class sessions), regardless of the reasons for the absences. The full Bard College Berlin attendance policy can be found in the Student Handbook, Section 2.8.

<u>Assessment</u>

Students will receive a midterm grade and a final grade for the course.

Students are assessed on their willingness to experiment, their contributions offering feedback during critiques, and on their ability to work effectively (in collaborative groups and independently) throughout the semester. Grading will reflect the creative ambition, time investment, strength of concept, skillful execution, and overall quality of the finished artworks. This assessment will also include the student's ability to adequately manage their time for working and clean-up of the materials and spaces used at BCB.

Grade Breakdown

70% Work (meaning all assignments and artworks made for class and presented for critique.)

30% Attendance, participation, and professionalism (being punctual, effective, respectful, and contributing to critiques and discussions.)

Assignments are due at the beginning of the next class session unless otherwise specified. Further information about assignments and projects will be explained in detail in class. Assignments and the due dates described in this syllabus are subject to change by the instructor. Students will be notified of any changes to the syllabus in class and via email. Students must regularly check their BCB email accounts.

Students are encouraged to make appointments with the instructor during office hours to discuss assignments and participation, or they may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

IMPORTANT- Please be aware that basic art materials will be provided, though some materials may need to be purchased directly by each student at their own expense depending on individual project

goals.

Policy on Late Submission of Artworks / Presentations

Assignments (artworks, projects, or presentations) that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The Professor is not obliged to accept assignments that are more than 24 hours late. Where a professor agrees to accept a late assignment, it should be submitted by the new deadline agreed upon by both parties. Thereafter, the student will receive a failing grade for the assignment. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students may make an appointment to discuss assignments and feedback during instructors' office hours.

Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

Begin drawing by exploring gesture, contour, negative space, shape, and shading. Bauhaus Vorkurs drawing exercises, "Skating on Paper," "Skating & Circumnavigating Points," etc. Paul Klee, "An active line on a walk, moving freely,

without goal." (Drawing is taking a line for a walk.) Free association words.

Assignment: 3 finished drawings on 3 sheets of paper, using words selected in class.

Wk 2: Sep 8 Combining text and images: exploring Dada poetry, Cut-up technique, aleatory /

oblique strategies, comics, memes, and graphic design. Slideshow and discussion

of possibilities and challenges that arise when combining text and imagery.

Assignment: 3 finished works combining text and imagery. 1) Combining (found) printed text with

hand-drawn elements. 2) Using hand-drawn text. 3) Artist's choice.

Wk 3: Sep 15 Drawing without drawing, Shape Engines, and the "Wangechi von Wulffen Method."

(artists referenced: Wangechi Mutu, Amelie von Wulffen, and Huma Bhabha)

Individual & collaborative drawing exercises. Assess & discuss pieces finished for

last week's assignment.

Assignment: 3 finished drawings using techniques demonstrated in class. 1) Fantastical Figures

2) Psychological Spaces 3) Artist's Choice.

Wk 4: Sep 22 Layered Lines: merge and meld multiple figures and perspectives. Collages

as the source material for making complex, surreal figurative drawings. (artist

references: Picabia, Danica Lundy, Jason Fox.)

Continue Shape Engines exercises: shape inventory.

Assignment: 2 finished figurative drawings using techniques demonstrated in class. 1 finished

Shape Inventory with 12 unique shapes.

Wk 5: Sep 29 "1,000 Hours of Staring" slideshow. Horror Vacui / Kenophia drawing projects.

Drawings that fill the page (in the broadest sense of "fill"); pieces that utilize the entire surface area from edge-to-edge, paying special attention to time, process, technique, materials, concept, and artistic intention. Discussion of automatic

drawing, randomness, repetition, and conceptual strategies.

Assignment: 2 finished Horror Vacui / Kenophobia conceptual drawings, "filled" to the edges. Plan

and prepare to start Midterm Projects next session.

Wk 6: Oct 6 Studio work session, individual meetings to discuss Midterm Project progress.

Assignment: Finish Midterm Projects.

Wk 7: Oct 13 Midterm Projects due today. Midterm presentations and group critique.

(Attendance is especially important.)

Wk 8: Oct 27 Introduction to Linoleum block printing.

Assignment: Finish cutting lino blocks.

Wk 9: Nov 3 Print carved linoleum blocks.

Assignment: Complete a set of prints.

Wk 10: Nov 10 Share & discuss linocut prints. Continue Shape Engine exercises: sculpting small

objects with air-clay, cut-paper theater, maquettes, object arrangements, tableaux.

Assignment: Finish Shape Engine sculptures and arrangements.

Wk 11: Nov 17 Drawing Shape Engine maquettes from observation. 3-hour drawing session.

Making careful, detailed drawings of object arrangements.

Assignment: Finish detailed object arrangement drawings. Begin working on Final Projects.

Wk 12: Nov 24 Studio work session, individual meetings to discuss progress of Final Projects.

Assignment: Finish on Final Projects.

Wk 13: Dec 1 Installation of artworks. Presentations and group critiques of Final Projects.

(Attendance is especially important.)

Wk 14: Dec 8 Presentations and group critiques of Final Projects.

(Attendance is especially important.)

Friday, Dec 12 "Open Studios at Monopol" exhibition from 6-9pm. (date / time subject to change.)

Dec 15 - 19 Completion Week. Direktorenhaus Workshop cleaned, BCB tools & art

supplies returned. All student artworks & personal materials removed.

Policy on the use of facilities:

- 1. The Factory (Eichenstrasse 43) and Monopol (Provinzstr 40-44) at BCB offer space and facilities to BCB art students. Chip access is from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. every day, including the weekends during the semester. The buildings cannot be used outside these hours.
- 2. Fire exits and lanes must be kept clear of any obstructions.
- 3. Students agree only to use the designated class spaces or communal workshops. Respecting the building and its facilities is crucial, as they are shared resources that need to be preserved for the benefit of all.
- 4. For your safety and the safety of others, smoking and drinking alcohol are strictly prohibited anywhere inside the building.
- 5. Unauthorized events and/or parties are not permitted. Projects using open flames (such as candles, torches, lanterns, fireworks, etc.) are not permitted inside the building.
- 6. Spray painting and handling any hazardous (chemical or combustible) material is not permitted inside the building.
- 7. All work surfaces (indoor and outdoor) must be adequately protected with the workshop's drop cloth before spray painting or working with plaster.
- 8. During completion week, any space used by a student must be emptied, with clean walls and floors. All garbage must be adequately disposed of. Final grades may be affected or withheld if any item remains by the inspection deadline.
- 9. When leaving the building, students must ensure all lights are turned off, all electrical items must be unplugged, and doors must be closed.
