FA302 Advanced Painting: Oil Paint & After

Course Description

This advanced studio course is designed to connect the gamut of materials and techniques in contemporary painting with the development of an individual artistic style. Weekly sessions will expose students to a range of traditional and experimental painting techniques with the aim of harmonizing materials and techniques with form and content. From classic linseed oil through to iridescent color-shifting acrylic additives, students will learn to mix and use paint more effectively, making the medium integral to the subject and content of their art. Past topics of exploration include: making paint with pigments, customizing paint consistency, airbrushing, glazing, masking, frottage, mixed-media collage, alternatives to mineral spirits, preparing grounds, encaustic wax, modeling pastes, and inkjet printing on canvas. Material demonstrations will be augmented by readings, slideshows, and contemporary art gallery tours. The syllabus begins with directed projects that become increasingly independent as the semester proceeds. Students are expected to have prior painting experience, be willing to experiment, and be highly motivated to make and discuss art. Class size is limited to ensure each student has abundant studio space and time with the professor for individual feedback and support. Evaluations and critiques occur at midterm and at the end of the term. The semester culminates in the "Open Studios" exhibition in the BCB arts building at Monopol Berlin.

Studio work is the priority, so this course will require a significant amount of time working outside of class sessions. Prospective students should email their questions to the professor directly at: j.kleckner at berlin.bard.edu

Requirements

Students are expected to:

- Turn off phones during class time.

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all class sessions on time and for the full duration of the session. *Tardiness more than 15 minutes will be considered an absence.*

Attendance at all classes is a crucial part of the education offered by Bard College Berlin. To account for minor circumstances, ONE absence from this once-per-week course should not affect the grade or require documentation. More than one unexcused absence will significantly lower the overall grade.

Bard College Berlin may not offer credit for any course in which a student has missed more than 30% of classes (4 class sessions), regardless of the reasons for the absences. The full Bard College Berlin attendance policy can be found in the Student Handbook, Section 2.8.

Assessment

Students will receive a midterm grade and a final grade for the course.

Students are assessed on their willingness to experiment, their contributions offering feedback during critiques, and on their ability to work effectively (in collaborative groups and independently) throughout the semester. Grading will reflect the creative ambition, time investment, strength of concept, skillful execution, and overall quality of the finished artworks. This assessment will also include the student's ability to adequately manage their time for working and clean-up of the materials and spaces used at BCB.

Grade Breakdown

70% Work (meaning all assignments and artworks made for class and presented for critique.)

30% Attendance, participation, and professionalism (being punctual,

effective, respectful, and contributing to critiques and discussions.)

Assignments are due at the beginning of the next class session unless otherwise specified. Further information about assignments and projects will be explained in detail in class. Assignments and the due dates described in this syllabus are subject to change by the instructor. Students will be notified of any changes to the syllabus in class and via email. Students must regularly check their BCB email accounts.

Students are encouraged to make appointments with the instructor during office hours to discuss assignments and participation, or they may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

IMPORTANT- Please be aware that basic art materials will be provided, though some materials may need to be purchased directly by each student at their own expense depending on individual project goals.

Policy on Late Submission of Artworks / Presentations

Assignments (artworks, projects, or presentations) that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The Professor is not obliged to accept assignments that are more than 24 hours late. Where a professor agrees to accept a late assignment, it should be

submitted by the new deadline agreed upon by both parties. Thereafter, the student will receive a failing grade for the assignment. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students may make an appointment to discuss assignments and feedback during instructors' office hours.

Students receive mid- and end-of-semester grades for their seminar work. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

Schedule

Week 1: Sept 3	Introduction to course, expectations, and materials. Designate and set-up studios. Overview of responsible studio etiquette, safe handling & disposal of materials.
Assignment:	Research (living) painters. Read Amy Sillman's "On Color" essay. Bring an unusual material to be stretched or mounted on a 20x30cm stretcher frame.
Wk 2: Sept 10	Discussion of the properties of various paints (acrylic, oil, gouache, enamel, etc.) Preparing surfaces, Gesso, Sizing, Imprägnierung, (non-)absorbent grounds. Stretch and prepare an unusual material (old clothing, burlap, plastic, etc) to use as a painting support. Assembling stretchers and stretching canvas demonstration. Share (living) painter research and students' prior artworks. Discuss assigned essay.
Assignment:	Begin Painting Project #1 (unusual ground). Begin Project #2 (stretched canvas.)

Wk 3: Sept 17	Mixing precise colors, making color gradients. Overview of color theory and terminology (hue, value, chroma, crispening, local color, color constancy.) Slides, discussion, and paint mixing exercises.
Assignment:	<i>Finish Project #1 (due next session.) Continue Project #2. Mix 3 precise color gradients.</i>
Wk 4: Sept 24	Paint handling, quality of brushstrokes (heavy handed, lightly touched, etc.) Gesture, surface texture, painting mediums and additives, impasto pastes, Malbutter, Maroger, gels, alkyd, etc. Slide presentation & discussion.
Assignment:	Finish Project #2.
Wk 5: Oct 1	Making paint from pigments. Enhancing surface texture, further paint additives, iridescent & interference pigments, glass beads, and modeling paste.
Assignment:	Begin Project #3 (Midterm)
Wk 6: Oct 8 Assignment:	Studio work session, individual meetings to discuss Midterm Projects. Finish Project #3 (Midterm)
Wk 7: Oct 15	Project #3 (Midterm) due today. Midterm presentations & group critiques. (Attendance is especially important.)

Wk 8: Oct 29	Edges: masking with tape, frisket film, masking fluid, and stencils. Creating spatial depth, how to better use highlights, shadows, and atmospheric zones.
Assignment:	Begin Painting Project #4.
Wk 9: Nov 5	Analyzing the subject, content, and context of selected paintings. Slide presentation & discussion.
Assignment:	Finish Painting Project #4.
Wk 10: Nov 12	Considering material as metaphor. Further discussions of subject, content, and context. Accompanying their Final Project students will write a brief statement outlining the concepts of their overall project or a specific piece. This text should address <i>what, how, and why</i> questions about their work.
Assignment:	Begin Painting Project #5 (Final Project) and write 1st draft of artist statement.
Wk 11: Nov 19 Assignment:	Studio work session, individual meetings to discuss Final Projects and statements. Continue Project #5 (Final Project) and edit draft artist statement.
Wk 12: Nov 26 Assignment:	Studio work session, individual meetings to discuss Final Projects. Finish Project #5 (Final Project) and finish artist statement.
Wk 13: Dec 3	Installation of artworks. Presentation & group critiques of Final Projects. (Attendance is especially important.)
Wk 14: Dec 10	Continue presentation & group critiques of Final Projects. (Attendance is especially important.)
Friday, Dec 12	"Open Studios" exhibition from 4-8pm. (date / time may change.)
Dec 15 - 19	Completion Week. Direktorenhaus Studios cleaned, BCB tools & art supplies returned. All student artworks & personal materials removed.

Policy on the use of facilities:

- 1. The Factory (Eichenstrasse 43) and Monopol (Provinzstr 40-44) at BCB offer space and facilities to BCB art students. Chip access is from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. every day, including the weekends during the semester. The buildings cannot be used outside these hours.
- 2. Fire exits and lanes must be kept clear of any obstructions.
- 3. Students agree only to use the designated class spaces or communal workshops. Respecting the building and its facilities is crucial, as they are shared resources that need to be preserved for the benefit of all.
- 4. For your safety and the safety of others, smoking and drinking alcohol are strictly prohibited anywhere inside the building.
- 5. Unauthorized events and/or parties are not permitted. Projects using open flames (such as candles, torches, lanterns, fireworks, etc.) are not permitted inside the building.

- 6. Spray painting and handling any hazardous (chemical or combustible) material is not permitted inside the building.
- 7. All work surfaces (indoor and outdoor) must be adequately protected with the workshop's drop cloth before spray painting or working with plaster.
- 8. During completion week, any space used by a student must be emptied, with clean walls and floors. All garbage must be adequately disposed of. Final grades may be affected or withheld if any item remains by the inspection deadline.
- 9. When leaving the building, students must ensure all lights are turned off, all electrical items must be unplugged, and doors must be closed.
