PL 320 Nietzsche: Philosophy at the Limit

Course Description

The influence of Nietzsche's work upon later continental philosophy is perhaps unparalleled. In this advanced course we will read selections from his major works in order to introduce central themes of his philosophy such as the will to power, the eternal recurrence and the death of God. Reading chronologically, we will trace through the development of Nietzsche's thought with special attention to Nietzsche's understanding of metaphysics and his preparations for an alternative future for philosophy. Of particular importance will be the role which Nietzsche's understanding of genealogy plays in these preparations. In this course we will also chart the history of the reception of Nietzsche's philosophy and become familiar with seminal works in the secondary literature such as those of Heidegger, Deleuze, Derrida, and Malabou. All texts will be read in translation, however, parallel readings in the original German will be supported and encouraged.

Requirements

Attendance is required in all classes. Absences are registered in all classes, and lateness is registered as an absence. More than two absences in a semester will affect your participation grade for the class. For periods of illness or leaves of absence consult the Student Handbook. Assessment and Writing Assignments: There will be specific reading assignments for each meeting. Everyone is expected to have done all assigned reading in advance. There will be a midterm essay of 2000 words due at 23:59 on October 18th. There will be a final essay of 3000 words due at 23:59 on December 19th. Each person will be required to give one 15 min. in class presentation introducing the specific reading for that meeting. Policy on Late Submission of Papers: All written work must be submitted electronically and on time. As the Student Handbook states: essays that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (from B+ to C+ for example). Instructors are not obliged to accept essays that are more than 24 hours late.
