

FA112 Marble Stone Sculpture

Course Description

This seminar provides students with a comprehensive introduction to working with stone; beginning with traditional hand tools such as hammers and chisels, and progressing to electric and pneumatic power tools, including advanced techniques for their effective use.

The aim is to create our own marble sculpture. Along the way we learn how to handle the necessary tools, from the first rough work, to finding the form, and finally the partial grinding and polishing of the marble. We learn the basics of three-dimensional form, proportion and structure. In order to create our own work of art, we also discuss the possible sources of creativity, and ways of accessing inspiration and imagination to create an individual sculpture.

The seminar will conclude with a presentation of all sculptures and a joint analysis of the different artistic languages present in each work. The workshops will be accompanied by lectures on the works and public sculpture projects of Raphael Beil and other contemporary sculptors.

Our workshops will take place in a sheltered beautiful garden in Reinickendorf on the grounds of Monopol. Hand tools, work tables as well as work protection will be provided. No previous experience is necessary to participate in the course. During winter we work in a tent with gas heaters.

Requirements

Important: Stones (one per student from a selection of different kinds of marble and alabaster) will be provided at an extra cost of **€50**. We kindly ask students to bring this amount in cash to our first class.

Students are expected to:

- Turn off phones during class time.
- Initiate appointments with the Professor or arts staff outside of class time.
- Always allocate extra time for work preparation and clean-up for independent production.
- Respond to emails from their professors in a timely manner.
- Inform their professors at the beginning of the semester if photos of student's identity, artwork, works in progress are NOT to be taken and / or used for Bard College Berlin.
- Remove all artworks, art materials, and / or any personal belongings before the end of the semester. Failure to remove works or return spaces clean and empty may result in final grade penalization. Donating unrequested artworks and / or art materials is not permitted and will still be considered student property, expected to be removed by your inspection deadline. It is important to consistently use all class sessions to work on your stone project. This is the only way to ensure continuous progress. In addition, it is possible, after consulting with the instructors, to continue working outside of regular class hours on a voluntary basis. However, these additional hours do not replace regular attendance and cannot be credited as a substitute for missed classes.

Bard College Berlin may not offer credit for any course in which a student has missed more

Assessment

End-of-term examination: presentation of completed work.

- Reflection of artistic process, including the coherence and integration of vision, material and technique.
- Finalized documentation as part of the presentation.

Marble Stone Sculpture is a course that allows students to use stone as their primary medium of artistic production. A wide range of stones will be provided, though depending on own expense. All hand tools and machines are supplied by the "School of Sculpture" at no additional cost. For this class, students are required to create and present artworks that are three-dimensional stone sculptures. Documentation of meetings on the theory of sculptural practice, design, and ideation, as well as the draft and development process of the individual project, will also be assessed. Students are also assessed on their ability to work independently and responsibly. They will be graded on how well they communicate with the professor as well as with each other. This includes their ambition to create artworks and their willingness to budget their time to meet all requirements of this class. The assessment also covers the preparation, production, and cleaning of the spaces used at the "School of Sculpture."

Policy on Late Submission of Artworks / Presentations

Assignments (artworks, essays, performances, oral presentations) that are up to 24 hours late will be downgraded one full grade (Example: B+ becomes C+). The Professor is not obliged to accept assignments that are more than 24 hours late. Where a professor agrees to accept a late assignment, it should be submitted by the new deadline agreed upon by both parties. Thereafter, the student will receive a failing grade for the assignment. Grades and comments will be returned to students in a timely fashion. Students may make an appointment to discuss assignments and feedback during instructors' office hours.

Students will receive feedback for their course work during and at the end of the semester. Students are entitled to make an appointment with an instructor to discuss seminar participation, or may be asked to meet with the instructor at any stage in the semester regarding class progress.

Policy on the use of facilities:

1. The Factory (Eichenstrasse 43) and Monopol (Provinzstr 40-44) at BCB offer space and facilities to BCB art students. 7. During completion week, any space used by a student must be emptied, with clean walls and floors. All garbage must be adequately disposed of. Final grades may be affected or withheld if any item remains by the inspection deadline.
8. When leaving the building, students must ensure all lights are turned off, all electrical items must be unplugged, and doors must be closed.
